But the sector is facing difficulties in attracting new workers. Excessive concern with making profits has led to worse working conditions, which keeps young people and women away, while a large part of the workforce is soon expected to retire.

We say it's time for a change! 2021 is also a year for recovery.

The EU plans to invest over 800 billion euros in economic recovery from the pandemic. And we can all agree: massive investment should generate massive employment. Policy makers must invest in rail and railway workers to achieve a social and sustainable recovery.

We're calling on European leaders to take action – for a rail sector that's more attractive to work in, and to show real commitment to bringing more women and young people into employment, while ensuring good working conditions for all workers in the sector.

- Rail is green and made possible by its workers.
 - Investments in green transport must be matched by investments in improving jobs and working conditions, to make rail as sustainable socially as it is environmentally.
- Having more than one railway worker on board a train means safety for passengers.

Driver-only operations put you at risk in emergencies, while failing to provide good-quality services on board.

- Privatisation puts profits first and comfort and safety second. That's why rail must be in public hands, sufficiently and publicly funded.
- Computers and robots cannot run the railway system. Railway workers must have a say in how new technological changes are achieved – to keep rail safe for both workers and passengers.
