The ETF Women's Committee was created in May 2001 in Zagreb, by a decision of the 1st ETF Ordinary Congress. We are an ETF policymaking body.





Members:

- 1 woman representative from each ETF section (8)
- 1 young workers' women's representative
- 14 women members elected by the ETF Women's Conference taking into account the need for a regional and industrial balance.

The ETF Women's Conference takes place once every 5 years in conjunction with the ETF Congress

Our representation in all ETF Bodies

The Women's Committee is **represented in the ETF constitutional bodies** as follows:

- 8 of its members are elected as women representatives in the ETF Executive Committee.
- The Chairperson of the Women's Committee is a member of the ETF Executive Committee.
- 1 of the 9 members in the Executive Committee is elected to represent the women workers in the ETF Management Committee.
- At least 1 of the 2 ETF Vice-Presidents is a women and she is elected out of all women in the Executive Committee.



The central theme of the ETF work programme on gender equality for 2017-2022 is **Fair transport in Europe, fair jobs for women**.

To address the changes in the transport sector, the ETF Women's Committee has activities and is involved in projects and campaigns.
